CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Personally, I would prefer to have the hot weather currently being experienced in the South of Europe rather than our more maritime conditions, a few degrees higher would be welcome and the wind could do with backing-off a bit.

Talking of enjoyment, I have been pleased to see so many people enjoying our beautiful village green, especially the volleyball players who are there every Sunday.

On the subject of the acquisition of Green, the only thing I can report is that there is nothing to report! The owners, the "Ladies of the Manor", are not responding to our letters requesting to either continue with the purchase of the freehold or take out an official lease on the land. Trying to move things forward is becoming rather tedious but we shall not give up.

A14 road works:

There has been some reduction in the volume of traffic passing through Beyton since the high numbers which were recorded in May. However, our Speed Watch team continues to record over 4000 vehicle movements per day into Beyton along Thurston Road, which is twice the norm.

The recent reduction is due to the efforts of Highways England to keep through traffic on the A14 using appropriate signage. Also, regular travellers have realised that there is little to gain from seeking alternative cross-country routes.

Clean-up Beyton:

We have a provisional date of Saturday 14th October for our Autumn Litter Pick. Please keep an eye out for posters nearer to the date and consider joining in.

Taxi/Bus to Bury: The twice weekly service is proving to be quite popular and the Parish Council has agreed to extend the trial until the end of the year.

BEYTON ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP (BEG)

No Mow May, Let it Bloom June, now what??

I was thinking of mowing the lawn the other day, the garden needed tidying up. Then I noticed two greenfinch feeding on wildflower seeds, blackbirds eating the insects living on the lawn and many many bees and overflies enjoying the nectar from the white clover. I decided I did not really need to mow the lawn at that time-so I didn't. Instead I did a bit of a BioBlitz of the garden – 42 species of wildflower (not ones I had planted), 7 species of butterfly (including a less common Brown Argus), 10 species of bird and many, many other insects. Marjoram is a great plant for pollinators.

Looking round the village and elsewhere, it seems many people are becoming more sympathetic to the concept of "No-Mow May" to give our wildflowers and ourpollinators a chance. After that, it becomes more difficult because plants going to seed can look messy. Plantlife make some suggestions for supporting wildlife in gardens by not cutting all the grass at once.

- **a.** Where grass growth is not so lush, try a wildflower lawn and mow every 4-8 weeks. You can mow patches in rotation.
- **b.** Create a hay meadow of longer grasses and taller plants, mowing 2x per year outside April to July.
- **c.** Don't mow the boundaries and allow grass tussocks and tall herbs to grow. Just remove brambles and woody suckers. This provides added protection for toads and voles.

Any or all of these can help wildlife and add diversity to the garden landscape. Whatever you can cope with, please give it a go.

The Plantlife website also makes the point that you should check for wildlife before mowing and always mow from the centre of the lawn to the edges to give creatures a better chance of escaping. I tend to cut a narrow border round flowerbeds to give them more definition and to make wildlife patches look deliberate. I will have to check if this is OK.

If anyone decides to do a survey of garden wildlife, BEG would be really interested in the results. I am just about to start reading Dave Goulson's The Garden Jungle (or Gardening to Save the Planet) for further inspiration.

THE VILLAGE PUMP

Many of you may not be aware, but back in ancient times (well the 1940's and 50's) not all houses had been connected to a supply of mains water. This issue was overcome by the use of either a well or a hand pump connected via a pipe down to the underground aquifer.

In my early childhood I lived in an asbestos bungalow situated on the site now occupied by Summer Mead in Quaker Lane. My parents and I lived there with my aunt and uncle, who occupied the bungalow as tied tenants, my uncle working for Ivan Rogers on the adjoining farm.

At that time there was a pump situated at the end of the drive, consisting of a tank in a brick "box" with a concrete slab on top and a hand pump connected to the tank (as far as I recall). Anyway, for us kids this was a natural assembly point, on top of the tank which was only maybe 3-4 feet high. In fact, such was the attraction, that one of my co-conspirators was given the nickname "Pumpy" – some of the older residents will know who I mean!

Going back to the pump, I'm not aware that it was still in use at this stage but had been built and located by the council to serve the council houses and ourselves in Quaker Lane, presumably at the time the council houses were built.

Similar pumps were located in Church Road, in the garden of No.4, again to serve the council houses built there, another was at the council estate in Thurston Road at number 7.

All of these pumps have now been removed without trace I believe BUT one pump still remains in a prominent position on the Green, this would have served the school and other houses in the vicinity.

I'm not sure when mains water was connected to the village. I cannot recall my father bringing water in buckets, so I guess that it was supplied to our house when built c 1952-3 but then only to the kitchen sink and the "washhouse", where it fed water to the sink and hence the coal fired copper, used for the Monday washday.

I have no idea how the other houses in the village fared. I suppose many had their own pump or well. I do know there is a well in the Oak Cottage at the bottom of the green and of course also at the White Horse.

Disclaimer!

These are my recollections as a small child, I believe most are factually correct, but I am more than willing to hear from anyone with different opinions, or who can add more to the story!
