# BEYTON PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



The big news for Beyton is, of course, that the Parish Council has finally managed to purchase The Green on behalf of the village.

Perhaps you saw the announcement on the Beyton website or NextDoor where – as I write – the story has been read by more than 2,000 people from the village and surrounding area.

But in case you missed it, the council has secured The Green after extraordinarily long and complex negotiations dating back many, many years.

Over that time many villagers – along with solicitors, of course – have been involved in the process of negotiation. However, it would be difficult to single out any individuals for fear of missing the contribution of others, so it is best to say to all those involved, the village owes you a debt of thanks.

It is no exaggeration to state that this is a momentous step for Beyton. For the first time, villagers, via the Parish Council, can take full responsibility for all aspects of The Green including insurance cover, granting permission for events, ensuring the care of all trees, the stream, and the like.

However, it is important to remember that the land will remain legally registered as a "Village Green" with no major changes anticipated.

Previously the council had a lease on the land but, over the years, this proved problematic, hence the need for negotiation and the council to take charge.

As our official statement read: "We would like to thank the Ladies of the Manor

– sisters Mrs Gloria Goodson and Mrs Sandra Bishop – from the Walpole family whose association with the village dates back to the 18th century. They have been helpful, understanding and considerate during what were quite detailed negotiations, and we thank them for their stewardship of the land over many, many years."

To commemorate the significance of this event, Beyton Parish Council plans to erect a plaque acknowledging the historic ownership by the Walpole family and the ultimate acquisition of The Green for the people of Beyton.

The unwelcome autumn storms caused havoc throughout Suffolk and with it brought flooding to the familiar arears of Beyton (photo of Thurston Rd kindly taken by Wendy Lewis. Luckily, there were no reports of damage to homes in the village. By and large the ditches in the village flowed well, in fact perhaps too well as water backed up trying to flow into Thurston. Basically, too much water flows into Beyton, is managed quite well through the village but not enough flows out. The Parish Council will continue to work with Suffolk County Council, the Environmental Agency and Anglia Water to resolve this ongoing problem – it is not going to be easy!

The Neighbourhood Plan has reached the stage where amendments requested by the Independent Inspector have been made to the draft which is now with MSDC for approval. This review will coincide with the Elections Team review of the electoral roll which means that a referendum on the plan is likely to be delayed until the end of February or the beginning of March 2024 – unless of course the government decides to call a General Election in the early part of the new year. I can't imagine a general election taking precedence over Beyton's NP – can you?

# THURSTON COMMUNITY COLLEGE NEWS



### St Martin-in-the-Fields

The College was contacted by Bridget Read, a resident of Thurston village, letting us know that St Martin-in-the-Fields singers were due to give an evening concert at St Peter's Church. Things moved at pace; Sophie Parry, one of our Performing Arts teachers managed to arrange two

workshops for our students with the St Martin singers (Beyton Campus in the morning and Thurston Campus in the afternoon). This was an exceptional opportunity for our students:

#### Edith (17 years of age and studying A Level Performing Arts - Music)

We are grateful to the amazing St Martin-in-the-Fields Choir who visited our Sixth Form at Beyton and led a vocal workshop for us. This was an incredible opportunity for all the students involved, working together with professional singers, as well as it giving us an insight into what future opportunities in ensemble singing and music could look like. From warming up with bodily percussion, to singing in beautiful four part harmonies, this was an experience that has helped many students become more confident in their singing abilities, and helped us to be more open to new musical experiences.

As we were so impressed with the experience and the songs that we were given to try, a few of us went to the concert later that the choir was putting on at St Peter's Church in Thurston, where they performed a four part concert and even sang one of the songs that we had learnt earlier in the day. It was so inspiring and exciting for us to sing as an ensemble that we put together an ensemble song for us to sing and perform at our music showcase a few weeks later.

Everyone is aware of the work that has been done to rejuvenate the pond behind the Bus Shelter, but this was but one of several ponds that once existed in the village.

As youngsters' water was for us, always a magnet to play in. Whether it was building a dam to hold back the water, or fishing for newts and sticklebacks (I'm not entirely sure the instinct ever goes away!)

Our favourite spot was always what we called "The Wash". This is the area near High Hedges where the water emerges from under the road at the North end of the Green. It was bigger in those days; traffic wasn't really an issue and it rarely dried up. There were always three spined sticklebacks and newts there, which we would catch in nets made from a piece of wire, one of mum's old stockings and a stick. We would then pop them in a jam jar on a piece of string, to be returned after much admiration!

This wasn't the only pond of course. There was "Joe Durrants" pond under a huge Elm Tree in the area now grassed over in front of the Old Thatch. This was always a sterile pond, due to the presence of the tree and the rotten leaves that accumulated. The only interest was a Kingcup plant growing at the back, under the tree. I still have a piece of this in the pond in my garden!

Another significant pond was the "Lily Pond". This is the one on the Hessett side of Chevin's Wood, now badly overgrown and bereft of lilies. I don't remember it ever being dry in those days and there was often a moorhen's nest on fallen branches on the wood side and it was full of white Easter lilies.

There were a series of ponds on Quaker Lane. Two on the North side, one opposite the terrace houses and another in front of the bungalow near the entrance to the old farmhouse. Both of these were overgrown and subsequently filled in, along with the connecting ditch.

I can vaguely remember another pond in the meadow behind Summer Lea, presumably for the cattle and horses kept on the farm in earlier days. This disappeared along with the hedges when the change to arable farming demanded larger fields.

Lastly the one pond which still exists, albeit in a poor state, is the one in front of "Hole in the Wall Cottage". This is badly overgrown and silted up. Beyton Environment Group did look at this, along with the owner and the contract farmer, a few years ago but nothing came of the on-site meeting. Although there was a mild expression of interest, the work involved in coppicing the hedge behind the pond and digging the pond out was seen as a big project beyond the resources available at the time, but maybe one day...

And we mustn't forget the BEG site ponds – one in the school orchard at Beyton Sixth and the two at Oak Tree Pond. The school one is a "proper"





pond always holding water and holding newts, dragon fly and damsel fly lava. Those at Oak Tree Pond are a work in progress, still drying out in late summer and too shaded for significant habitation by anything other than small insect populations

In bygone days ponds served 2 main functions, the first was the obvious one of providing water for the animals in the meadows, the second was to drive the carts through to soak the wheels in the summer months to prevent the spokes shrinking and loosening the structure of the wheel (as in Constable's Haywain). These ponds were maintained as an important part of the farm, they also provided a valuable wildlife resource.

In today's world this resource is critical to the welfare of much wildlife. Fortunately, it is now supplemented by the presence of garden ponds throughout the village which benefit both amphibians and insects.
