Chairman's report

Holidays are over, back to school for the young ones and time for the rest of us to reflect on what a beautiful summer it was. If they were all like that we would not have to jet off to warmer lands.

It seems like a while back now but I'm sure will remember our splendid Summer Fayre and Barn Dance, another great job by the BVA – And it didn't rain!

The Parish Council met at the beginning of September, and it may be useful to briefly mention some of the topics we discussed.

Firstly, we co-opted and welcomed a new member Helen Preston, however, there is still room for one more if anyone would like to join. The faded road markings at the junction of Thurston Road and Tostock Road is still a concern, and we agreed to pursue this again with Suffolk Highways. The village is owed more than twenty thousand pounds in CIL money which could be used for certain infrastructure projects, if you want to know more about this, I suggest that you join the PC or come along to one of our meetings.

Our finances are in good order, the current bank balance is £54,804.88

We have agreed to carry out repairs to the children's roundabout and the flat seat swing, but the suggestion from some residents to install an aerial runway and multi goal was seen to be a bit too expensive.

We are pushing Suffolk Highways to complete ditch clearing along Beyton Rd, Thurston between the A14 culvert and the caravan park. Attending to this small section is seen as vital to allow the stream to flow through our village and prevent flooding at the north end of The Green.

A short update on The Neighbourhood plan was given at the September meeting to keep everyone aware of potential development in our community.

As you can see there is quite a lot of exciting stuff going on, you can stay abreast of all of this by reading the meeting minutes which are posted on the Beyton Website or better still attending our PC meetings or even better still joining the Parish Council – there is an opening right now

Nature Notes

It was not this summer. And when it's very hot everything goes quiet, very quiet. The birds stop singing and even the bees stop buzzing. We all collapse, exhausted.

Recently the meadows around Beyton have been filled with purple flowers on tall stems, Willowherb I believe. If you looked closely, you will have seen what a spectacular form this plant takes. The flowers eventually give way to pods which release seeds like fluffy feathers that drift away in the breeze. The pods then open fully, curl back and entwine to produce an intricate, almost metallic, tube along the top of the stem. A weed? No way, a truly impressive wild flower.

Parking

Over the past year or so there has been a noticeable increase in unhelpful parking around Beyton.



Parking on The Green, parking when bumped on a kerb, parking the wrong way – i.e. facing oncoming traffic – are all problems, albeit minor, in the village.

Parish Councillors are hoping that this small note that reminds parishioners that:

- parking on any part of the Village Greens is not allowed and that includes the verge;
- that parking the wrong way on a road at night is a violation of the Highway Code;
- that while bumping your car on a pavement is not illegal, it can cause difficulty for pedestrians. And, for example on the Bury Road, the width of the road means it is entirely unnecessary . . . will serve to end these unhelpful practices before the Parish Council needs to take further steps.

What a difference the weather makes! For the first time for many years, we had a Summer Fayre with no rain and it was the busiest one I have seen.

The weekend started with a bang on the Friday night with a barn dance led by the Skylarking Ceilidh Band and there was a great turnout with 85 tickets sold. It was great to see people up dancing right from the start of the evening and still going until the very end at 11.00pm, with much dust being raised by the rhythmic stamping of feet on the dry ground.

The Fayre itself was opened by Rev'd Sarah Lock, who led a countdown to the opening, culminating in the cutting of a ceremonial ribbon. The stalls were made up of old favourites such as the coconut shy and the bottle tombola along with new attractions such as Welly Wanging and Beat the Goalie. Live music was provided in the marquee throughout the afternoon by Robin Torbitt and friends.

Because the ground was dry, we were able to hold the children's races and the tug of war for the first time for a few years and in the tug of war Beyton children managed to beat the Rest of the World. The dog show was so popular this year that it took quite a while for the dogs to walk around the central arena and for the judges to work their way along the line looking at each dog. Prizes for the dog show were kindly donated by Eastgate Vets.

Thanks to all the committee members who worked so hard to make the event a success and to all the people who volunteered to help by running stalls on the day. Particular thanks to the team who put up and take down the marquee as this is a big task and special thank you to Adrian & Lois, Chris & Simon who kindly allowed us to use their electricity during the day. Without everyone's help an event like this couldn't happen!

Thanks also to everyone who responded to our request ahead of the fayre and donated items for stalls – the cake stall was particularly successful this year thanks to donations. And many thanks to the White Horse for providing the bar and food for the barn dance and the bar for the fayre.



Remembrance Sunday in Beyton Sunday 9th, November at 10.50am


9.00am Holy Communion and Laying of Wreaths, All Saints Church 10.50am Community Act of Remembrance on the Green.
